Keywords, Questions, and Locations	Keywords: Tiles, Iznik, Islam, patterns, naturalist, Ottoman, Turks/Turkish. Locations: University of Toronto Library search Questions: What is the symbolism of the different elements? How did the adoption of Islam influence the tiles?
Type, Purpose, Authority, and Bias	Type: Scholarly Journal Purpose: To provide people, particularly English speakers with an analysis of Ottoman tile decoration art. There are many Turkish sources about Turkish tile art, but that only educates Turkish speakers, and many people will not learn about Ottoman tile art. Because the writing is in English, information about Turkish tiles, from Turkish journal articles and other academic writings is made available to a Western audience.

Organizing the research process

	Authority: The article is written by Nurdan Oncel Taskiran and Nursel Bolat, the former being a PhD holder who is an associate professor at Kocaeli University. The latter, Nurse Bolat, is a lecturer at the Istanbul Arel University. Both the authors are well educated and are well-versed in the subjects the source deals with.
Organization, Evidence, and Currency	Organization: The work does not have a table of contents, but different ideas are sectioned off into appropriate subsections, numbered in a logical fashion, making the work easy to navigate. Evidence: The author provides a well-formatted references list of 21 different and varied sources, which convinces me of its reliability. The bibliography is comprehensive, as sources are not all from one approximate date of publication, which contributes to the source's trustworthiness. Currency: Published in 2012, which is relatively recent, given many of the other sources available to me were published in the early 2000s or earlier. I would say that I am very confident that the information and analysis presented in the work is current enough for my purposes, especially because of the recent update.

Final Evaluation

I would use this source in a research paper about my object, as I am confident in its reliability due to the extensive references list. The sources on the references list are varied, from academic writings and thesis to magazine articles, providing a very full perspective on Ottoman tile art, the history of how it evolved and changed, and other concepts explored in the article. It has been written by two very well educated and well qualified Turkish authors, which reassures me of it's validity as a source for a research paper.
